## OLLY'S PONDERIN

One of my favorite verses in the old testament is found in Deuteronomy 6:4-9 and it reads: "Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God, the Lord is one. Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength. These commandments that I give you today are to be on your hearts. Impress them on your children. Talk about them when you sit at home and when you walk along the road, when you lie down and when you get up. Tie them as symbols on your hands and bind them on our foreheads. Write them on the doorframes of your houses and on your gates." Now I know that the scripture was not talking about Christian symbols because of course Christ had not yet been born. But, I love the instruction to take the things of God and talk about them with your children and to mark the importance of our faith traditions with symbols. So you might see how this week when the Worship Committee was decorating the church for Advent and Christmas I saw this scripture come to life. And I saw a great opportunity to talk about our faith with our kids through the symbols of our faith, as they are beautifully presented on the Chrismon Tree in the Sanctuary.

I must confess I did not always understand the significance of the Chrismon tree, that is until one year I wrote a play for the youth to perform on Christmas Eve. In the play a family was gathering together at Grandma and Grandpa's house. After each family arrived with their children in tow, they were gathered around Grandma who sat in her rocker, distributed each Chrismon. As its meaning was shared, it was placed on the tree. Perhaps, like I, you are not familiar with the story behind the tradition.

They were first made by Frances Kipps Spencer at the Ascension Lutheran Church in Danville, Virginia. She also thought of the word, Chrismon, which is a combination of Christ and monogram (meaning symbol). The idea quickly spread to other churches. It is tradition that Christian groups make their own Chrismons with their favorite symbols on them. Still today this tradition is celebrated in many churches. The Christmons are still traditionally white and gold, the liturgical colors of Christmas. White symbolizes that Jesus was pure and perfect. Gold symbolizes His Majesty and Glory.

Below are some symbols that are common Chrismons and what they represent to Christians.

The Cross symbolizes that Christians believe Jesus Christ died for everyone on a cross.

The Irish or Celtic Cross is a normal cross with a circle in the middle to symbolize eternity.

The Triumphant Cross represents the earth with the cross on top and it symbolizes that Jesus is triumphant over anything we can face in the world.

The Fish is one of the oldest Christian symbols. The letter, from the Greek word for fish (Ichthys), stand for Jesus, Christ, God, Son, Savior. Some of Jesus' disciples were fishermen.

Alpha and Omega are the first and the last letters of the Greek alphabet. Used together, they symbolize the Christian belief that Jesus is the beginning and the end of all things.

The Chi Rho looks like a "P" with an "X" on tope of it. These two letters are the first two letters of the Greek word 'Christos' which means Christ.

The Crown is the symbol that Jesus is King, who rules over heaven and earth.

The Triquetra (three loops that form a triangle) and The Trefoil (three equal circles intertwined) represent the three parts of the Trinity (God, Jesus and the Holy Spirit).

The Shepherd's Crook or Staff remembers that Jesus sometimes called himself a shepherd, as well as reminding us that the shepherds were the first people to be told about the birth of Jesus. While The Lamb reminds us that Jesus is call the Lamb of God, who was sacrificed on the cross to forgive our sins.

It is my hope that you will take some time this Christmas season to stop by our Christmon Tree and help your children learn from the symbols hanging there and in some small way you will be honoring the spirit of the verse from Deuteronomy. We may even have a few kits available for those families that wish to make one. You can check with the church office.








We hope you make plans to join us in Worship on Sunday, December 16th, when our Children's Christmas Choir is scheduled to perform!

If you are new to FUMC you may be asking "What is a Cookie Walk?" Tables and tables of HOMEMADE COOKIES! Sold by the pound. Each customer is provided with a bakery box to walk around the tables choosing the cookies they wish to purchase. We weigh their box on the way out...it's that simple.

## What do we need from YOU? \*\*COOKIES AND MORE COOKIES!! \*\*

We need many varieties of fresh-baked delicious cookies; good old-fashioned ones as well as fun new creations.

Details: All must be Homemade Goodies. (Fudge and Candies are also welcome) Each family is asked to commit to making a MINIMUM of 5 pounds (which should be about equivalent to a double or triple batch, maybe 4-5 dozen). They should be fresh baked that week. Cookies can be made by people individually or some work in teams at the church. We really need medium or smaller size, attractive cookies that have a little weight to them. Larger ones are fine if they are specialty...we often bag those individually or in small batches. Festive Christmas cookies are a big hit. We don't need too many of the ordinary cookies (Plain Chocolate chip, etc), no matter how delicious, they don't sell as well at these type of events, so although we still need them, we will limit the number of basic cookies. Please call the church or Beth Vickers (255-1406) to sign up and let us know what variety of cookies you are bringing (that way we don't have too many of the same kind!). If you need help, we have a list of suggested recipes available. (there are many wonderful Christmas cookie ideas on Pinterest under "Cookie Walk") We will need the cookies delivered to the church by Friday, December 7th.

## **Worship Committee**




